For case managers seeking resources on school to adult life transition, key areas to explore include transition planning guides, disability-specific transition resources, information on relevant agencies, pre-ETS, vocational training programs, independent living skills development curricula, and support groups for young adults transitioning from school to adulthood. The focus should be on individualized plans that consider each person's unique strengths, interests, goals, and needs.

Key Considerations for Case Managers

- Individualized Plans: Develop personalized transition plans based on everyone's strengths, needs, and goals.
- **Collaboration:** Engage with families, schools, community agencies, and healthcare providers throughout the transition process.
- **Early Intervention:** Begin transition planning early in high school to ensure adequate preparation for adulthood.
- Advocacy: Support individuals in navigating complex systems and accessing necessary services.

Transition from School to Adulthood

The transition from school to adult life begins in Indiana at age 14 or eighth grade. Students with a disability who have an individualized education program (IEP), and their support team begin focusing on the student's post-school education, employment, and independent living goals with the desired outcome of living a full life in their community with the services and supports they need to be maximally independent.

Each has its own eligibility requirements for enrollment that may vary depending on the institution.

Competitive Integrated Employment

Competitive Integrated Employment is work that is performed on a full-time or part-time basis for which an individual is:

- Compensated at or above minimum wage and comparable to the customary rate paid by the employer to employees without disabilities performing similar duties and with similar training and experience.
- Receiving the same level of benefits provided to other employees without disabilities in similar positions.
- At a location where the employee interacts with other individuals without disabilities; and given the same advancement opportunities as other employees without disabilities in similar positions.
